

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The Purpose of the Local Church By Bill Hall

What is the purpose of the Lord's church? Is it to eradicate poverty, disease, social injustice, illiteracy from among men? Is it to bring about a cessation of war and conflict? Is it to campaign for a temptation-free society for Christians to live in?

If the church had as one of its great goals the eradication of disease, the Lord could have easily equipped it to accomplish that goal. Could not the same power that enabled one blind man to see have enabled all blind men to see; that enabled one lame man to walk have enabled all lame people to walk; that cured many people of varied diseases have cured all people of all diseases? And could not this same power have been given to the church in all generations?

If the church has as one of its great goals the eradication of poverty, the Lord could have easily equipped it to accomplish this purpose. After all, He fed the five thousand with five loaves and two fishes. He similarly fed four thousand on another occasion. Could not He who did these marvelous works have enabled His church in all generations to feed, shelter clothe, and the impoverished masses of the world through miraculous powers?

If the Lord had wanted His

church to become a lobbyist group to apply political pressure toward a temptation and persecution-free society in which to live, He would have given instructions in that direction. He did not even lead His church into a direct effort to destroy slavery, but taught the Christian slave to be a better slave and the Christian master to treat his slaves as he would have his heavenly Master treat him, Col 3:22-4:1.

The church's purpose is to save souls and prepare people for eternity. It holds out to the impoverished the hope of someday walking a street of gold; to the suffering a time when there will be no pain; to the sorrowing a moment when "God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes." It tells the tempted and persecuted that there is value in these afflictions, that the testing of their faith is "more precious than of gold," and to rejoice. It tells all to

live godly lives in whatever environment thev find themselves. It seeks to change people through the power of the gospel, not society through the of legislators. coercion lts weapons "are not carnal, but are through God." mighty Its motivating theme: "For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?"

When local churches become involved in hospital and health clinic work, or when they build schools for the education of their children, or when they see as one of their great missions to provide for the world's poverty, or when they feel obligated to create social upheaval and campaign for human rights, or when they feel called upon to express their views on the government's use of nuclear armaments or whatever, they have a distorted view of the purpose of the church.



"And I will very gladly spend and be spent for your souls; though the more abundantly I love you, the less I am loved," 2 Cor 12:15 NKJV.

This is the same attitude Paul expressed about Christ in Philippians 2:1-8. It is an attitude of selflessness. Paul would GLADLY spend this strength, time, energy and all that he had for their souls because he loved them, the same love that Christ demonstrated for us, you and me in His death on the cross. Paul was willing to be spent, worn out in His service for the benefit of others because he loved them and would gladly exhaust himself in service for them.

"...prove yourselves to be blameless and harmless children of God above reproach in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation among whom you appear as lights in

the world, holding fast the word of LIFE ... You too, I urge you, rejoice and share my joy with you all,"

Phil 2:15,16,18 NASB. In verse 17 he refers to being poured out as a drink offering in order to service their faith. His actions were in support of their faith, to make their worship and daily life in Christ more spiritual, more pure, and more pleasing to God. Paul is encouraging them to follow his example — "you too!"

Now let's get personal, consider our willingness to spend and be spent in service of the faith of others, take the time for a personal inventory of where we are in "gladly willing to be spent" in serving our brethren!

"This is my commandment, that ye love one another, even as I have loved you. Greater love hath no man on a bed. Finding the house full of people and their way to Jesus blocked, they uncovered the roof where He was. So when they had broken through, they let down the bed on which the paralytic was lying. When Jesus saw their faith He said to the paralytic, 'Son, your sins are forgiven you.'"

This incident reminds us that faith brings a different point of view in getting lost people to Jesus. Four men who believed Jesus could make a profound difference in the life of their paralyzed friend refused to give up when they found the way to Jesus crowded and impossible to pass. What to do? Faithless, negative thinking would have said nothing could be done and there were simply too many obstacles. But one of them lifted his eyes and expressed a different point of view: "We can get on top of the house, tear the roof off and lower him down to Jesus." Faith helped them have a different point of view! As a result the paralyzed

man went home with a newly healed body and a freshly cleansed soul.

Many Christians could use a different point of view. The devil has convinced some in the church that our jobs as Christians is to come, sit and listen. But the proper evangelistic mentality is summed up in the words of Acts 5:20—"Go... stand... speak."

Some insist nobody they know is interested in God, but Jesus calls us to a different point of view. He says, "the harvest truly is plentiful" and "lift up your eyes and look at the fields, for they are already white for harvest," Mt 9:37; Jn 4:35.

Could it be many people are being kept from getting to Jesus because negative, faithless thinking is keeping us from getting to them? Faith can help us uncover the roof and see past what we alone can do to what we can do with God's help. Has faith changed your point of view?
